Cray Youth & Family Services Bowl-A-Thon



Some important information regarding Verizon / Bell Retiree benefits

Retirees, please make sure your Family is aware of the Death Benefit that you are entitled to! Many families have contacted the Pioneer Office for information and we thought we should share this with you to keep with your important papers.

It is recommended that all retirees call the benefits office to check on their eligibility, confirm their beneficiary information and ask for written confirmation. Verizon Benefits number is 1-855-489-2367. You will need to provide the last four digits of your social security number, your date of birth and your zip code. At this number you can check on your Life Insurance and also the Sickness/Pensioner Death Benefit (these are two separate benefits). The benefits office will provide written confirmation that you can keep in a safe place.


Don recently delivered a donation to Ed Hoover at the Penn Hills Service Association to help with their food bank. For the last four years we have been able to help with their supplies.

If we still have room left in the budget, we can get those books ordered for your school! Thanks for putting the word out!




40th Annual International Sports Jamboree North Bend State Park July, 2018

For more than a quarter century, youths from across the United States and Canada have come to West Virginia's North Bend State Park in the summer to enjoy what many of us take for granted. Racing, softball throw, basket Frisbee, horseshoes, bump-me-ball, bowling and team relay are just some of the events, in addition to dancing and singing with fellow campers, and squirting each other with water guns. At the International Sports Jamboree for the physically challenged, a yearly event sponsored by the New Vision West Virginia Pioneers as well as AT&T Pioneers, young adults, teens and pre-teens who are visually impaired or physically impaired can participate in recreational events designed for them. The theme this year was "We Are All Wonderfully Made", was held July 20-22 and was a really big success with 39 participants.

Basketball hoops "beep" so they can toss free throws into nets they cannot see. Wheelchairs fly down 40-yard slalom courses. Participants form teams for special contests like a pilot race in which a visually impaired contestant pushes a partner in a wheelchair with ever so careful directions.

FINANCIAL UPDATE- Mid-Year 2018

Many thanks to those of you who took the time to read and respond to the articles that were in our past issues of the Tele-All regarding our finances. You already know by now that we are no longer supported by a grant from Verizon to continue volunteer activities. Out of about 3,800 Fort Pitt members, only 133 are active employees paying dues (\$20 a year) of which we receive a portion. Also, as employees retire, and there are no more dues collected, even less is received. So far in 2018, we lost the dues of about 35 employees, and we are not permitted to solicit new members who are active employees.

From the request in our Spring issue, we have received 63 donations for a total of \$2,545 which is a little higher than this time last year. Only about 2% of our members are making a donation. Please remember, we are a self-sufficient charitable organization and we are always looking for new projects to benefit our local neighbors. We can only continue to do these community service projects with your help.

You can see the scope of the projects we perform and hopefully appreciate all of the good work that we carry on for the good of our local communities and to carry on the reputation of "Pioneers - Answering the call of those in need."

One way we can reduce expenses is to eliminate one issue of the Tele-All newsletter each year. The newsletter expenses have increased the past two years along with postage. Because this is our only means of communication with our members, this would be a last resort. You can help us now by making a donation in support of our projects, and the Tele-All printing and distribution

If you would like to continue to read about our projects and receive the Tele-All, please consider making a donation today. Even \$10 goes a long way when many donations are received!

Our goal is to demonstrate our commitment to community service opportunities for children, adults, seniors and veterans in areas of education, health and human services, and life enrichment projects. You have been reading about these projects in the Tele-All for years as the Clubs faithfully perform them. Please help us to continue to help these organizations!







Since 2005, Stephen Foster Club has been directly involved with the Blessings in a Backpack operation in the Wilkinsburg School District. Blessings in a Backpack is a national program that started with two schools and now serves more than 76,000 students in 44 states. It provides food for elementary school children who qualify for the federal free or reduced-cost meal program to take home for food for 38 weekends during the school year. We are proud to be affiliated with this project for almost 15 years.

All of the food is purchased with donations and costs about \$2.10 per child per week. Each week at 1:00 PM on Thursdays, the Founder, Linda Lafferty and volunteers, pick up the week's order from Sam's Club and then they head to Kelly Elementary School to pack 550 bags. They are usually done by 3:00 PM. The bags are filled with a package of macaroni and cheese, crackers, an individual size box of cereal, two juice boxes, a crisped rice treat, a cup of pudding or fruit, a package of microwave popcorn and fruit snacks.

As you travel, please collect the sample size soap, shampoo, lotion and any complimentary items provided by the hotels. These items are used to pack hygiene kits for the homeless folks and sent to Operation Save-A-Life, Operation Safety Net, Family Links and Jubilee Kitchen in Pittsburgh. We are no longer packing at the Verizon Garage in Monroeville and have moved the operation to Linda Schirano's home in Monroeville.

These kits are crucial - the agencies we serve continue to ask for them all year round and we typically prepare and distribute 100 kits a month. Other items that are always needed to complete the kits are washcloths, sample size toothpaste, toothbrushes, razors, combs and quart size zip lock bags.


